Concerted move to develop music and artists

CHENNAI: It was a rare confluence of music in the city, as musicians from different parts of the country came together on Monday to discuss ways to protect the art form, be it classical or folk.

Popular Hindustani and Carnatic musicians formed the All India Musicians Group (AIMG) with the objective of preserving the art of making music, improving the life of veteran artists and creating awareness of music education in schools.

The group comprises six musicians from the north and six from the south. The AIMG musicians from north are Ajoy Chakrabarty, Zakir Hussain, Jasraj, Rajan Mishra and Shivkumar Sharma. Those from the south are M. Balamuralikrishna, Chitraveena N. Ravikiran, Sudha Raghunathan, T.N. Seshagopalan and U. Srinivas.

Addressing presspersons here, sitar artist Arvind Parikh said the group was formed two years ago to take stock of the current situation in the light of globalisation. "If musicians raise a united voice for Indian music, the impact would be better," he said. Several issues such as protection and development of traditional forms of music

and nurturing young talent were discussed during the meetings held sometime ago in Mumbai and Delhi.

More funds allotted

Briefing about the meeting with Prasar Bharathi representatives in New Delhi, Mr. Parikh said the fund allocated for promotion of arts and culture has been increased from Rs. 33 crore to Rs. 49 crore. The representatives have also agreed to set up an appellate authority for musicians. A new committee to review the audition system, including two AIMG members would be formed.

Mr. Sharma said one of the best ways to preserve music is

to reach out to school and colege students and sprea awareness of tradition music.

Ms. Raghunathan said the group would function as a intermediary between the corporate sector and muscians to identity talent are help veteran musicians. She also highlighted the need formore art coverage in the media to encourage artists.
